STEAM IN DEEPANAM

WHAT IS STEAM?

STEAM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Math. STEAM is an integral education discipline that integrates these five subjects into hands-on, project based activities for children. Using projects that have real world uses, STEAM aims to teach kids in a practical fashion.

WHAT'S DIFFERENT ABOUT STEAM AT DEEPANAM COMPARED TO NORMAL CLASSES?

STEAM at deepanam is unique, as it integrates Auroville youth from YUVABE (An Auroville unit) as teachers. In Auroville, a place that represents human unity, the STEAM program at deepanam allows youth to serve the community by being teachers and the students at deepanam look up to them as mentors.

There is a strong focus on art in all the STEAM projects to make them aesthetically pleasing. By creatively making these projects aesthetically pleasing, the students add a little bit of themselves into these projects thus owning them.

WHAT'S THE PURPOSE OF THE ANNUAL STEAMFEST?

The purpose of the annual STEAMFEST is to showcase the student projects from the year to the parents of students and the Auroville community in general. The visitors get a hands-on experience themselves of how the students learn by engaging in a series of fun challenges.

Showcasing the projects helps students better understand their work as they have to explain to visitors what the projects are and answer any questions they might have. This also improves their presentation and communication skills.

Overall, the intent of the STEAMFEST day is to increase the curiosity and raise the enthusiasm of learning STEAM.

WHAT WAS SPECIAL ABOUT STEAMFEST '24?

This year, the STEAM classes explored literature as a medium to provide context for the STEAM projects. For example, drawing inspiration from Snow White's magic mirror, the students learnt about light and reflection and made an "infinity mirror" project. Another example is how kids learnt about morse code, encryption and decryption when they heard about military strategies from the famous stories of "Ramayana". Some students explored Greek Mythology and designed weapons for their Gods learning about potential energy, kinetic energy, elastic forces, tension, etc.

Thus, this year's STEAMFEST showcased these unique projects that the kids explained and demonstrated to the visitors. The visitors, both kids and adults were given a map of twelve activities they had to complete to get ice cream. There were also four special challenges which if they were to complete, they would get a certificate and a special prize. This event was well attended by over 250 people from the community and well appreciated.

I would like to share the story of Josh Waitzkin

He was a chess prodigy. Josh He quit playing chess around the age of 18. He was a naturally creative, aggressive chess player. His style was to create chaos on the chessboard, and his strength lay in finding hidden harmonies." With this style, Waitzkin won the U.S. Junior Chess Championship at the age of 11 and became an International Master at age 16. Then, Waitzkin got a coach who forced him to play like the world champions, Anatoly Karpov and Tigran Petrosian—"the most positional, conservative chess players". But when he was forced, he stopped playing the way he liked to play, he lost love for the game. So Waitzkin quit playing chess, and shortly after, he took up martial arts. He trained for just two years before he won his first national championship in martial arts. Asked if he took anything from chess into the martial arts, Waitzkin said, in the learning process, he followed his unique proclivities and leaned into his unique physical and mental traits. "And in my observation, any discipline, this is a really fundamental idea," he said. "Those who succeed, I think, basically manifest their unique character through their discipline."


