


St. George's Cross Medusa

Scientists discovered this Jellyfish in the Pacific Ocean. It was given its name due to the red cross in the middle which resembles the cross of St. George. It fends off predators by its Red cross giving it bioluminescent properties. The Jellyfishes distinct properties may suggest that it has chidarian venom (venom that contains toxins that can cause pain and paralysis)



Limestone eyelash pit viper

The Limestone Eyelash Pit Viper was discovered in the Thale Ban National park in southern thailand. The viper has a distinct eyelash like scale hence given its name. Its scales being limestone and sandy in colour give it an edge in camouflaging. Like other vipers it has heat sensitive pits on its face, which let it sense any warm blooded animal in the night. The viper contains hemotoxins which immobilise smaller rodents but despite it being harmful for their prey, scientists are still studying it for its medical benefits.



These fish species were found in deep sea environments. It is characterised by its grey gelatinous body which helps it withstand pressure in the deep sea environments. Not much is known about this fish as it has only been sighted once.

Patience is important for any teacher directing the play. it was necessary for us to balance discipline with encouragement, structure with creativity. There were times when students tested our limits—laziness, forgetfulness, attitude problems. But then, something would shift. A line would be delivered just right, acting would become instinctive, and suddenly, the performance came alive. In the end, the effort was always worth it.



Bringing Stories to Life

For the past seven years, Bhakti has been directing the play performances. She meticulously designs the backdrops and costumes, bringing the stories to life on stage. It's a ton of workload and requires hours of planning to get the desired results for stage props and costumes.

Under her direction, students have performed in big productions such as The Bluebird, The Hobbit, The Mysterious Benedict Society, A Midsummer Night's Dream, The Tempest, and As You Like It and in short plays based on Egyptian, Indian and Greek myths. Each play was unique as it was done by a different mix of students and skill set.

More Than Just a Play






I Like Craft Class - by Keerthi
